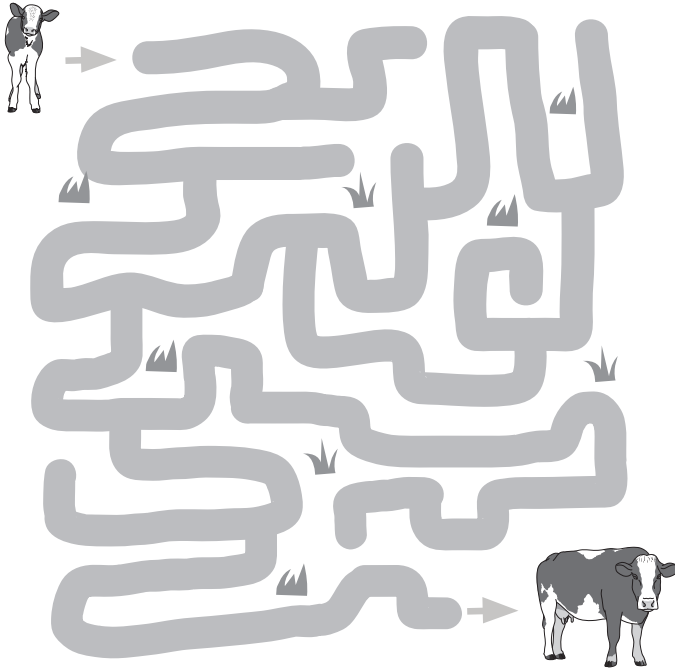

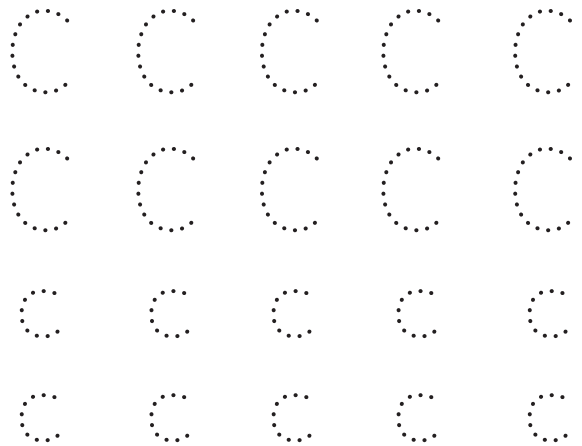
CALVES, CROWS, AND CATS



Help the calf find her mom across the grassy field.

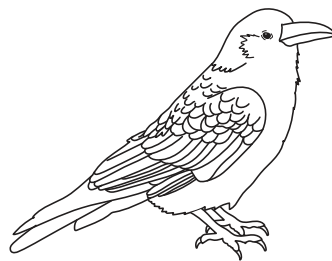

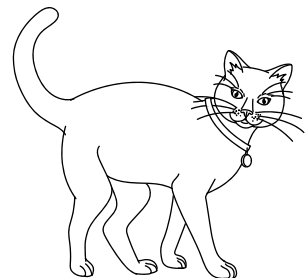
Did You Know?

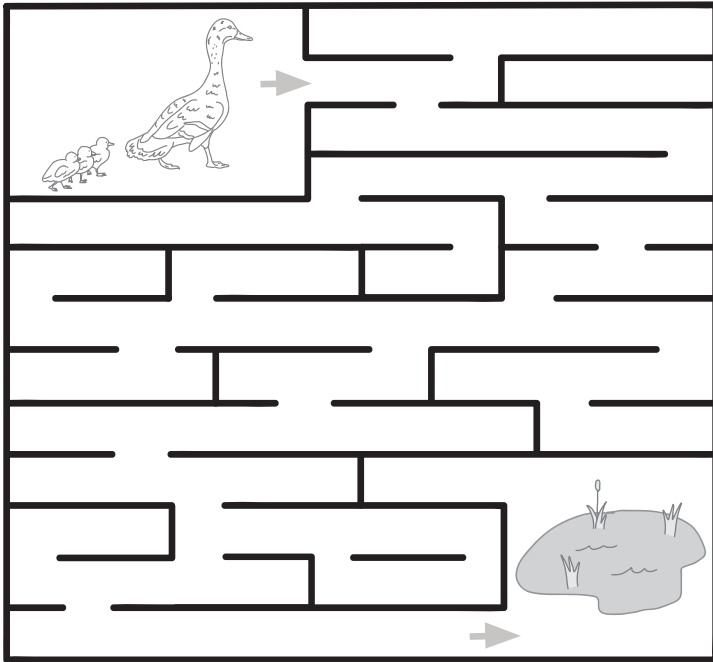

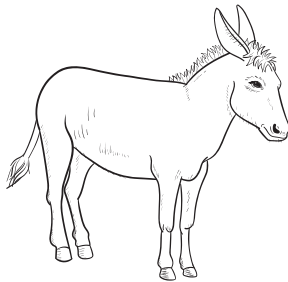
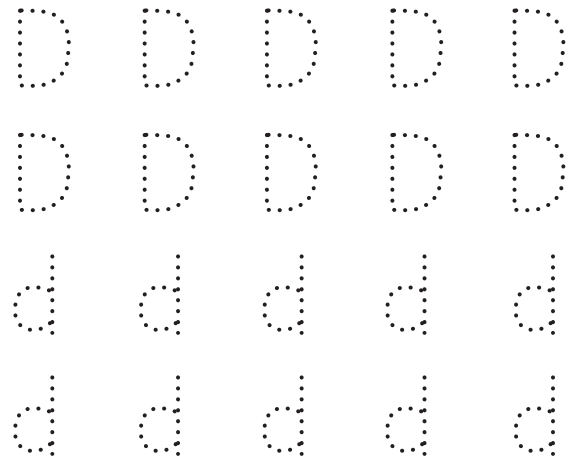
DONKEYS, DUCKS, AND DOLPHINS

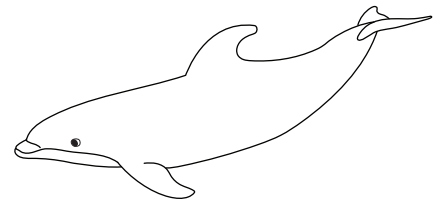
Did You Know?

Dolphins have unique whistles that help them recognize one another—almost like having their own names! If a dolphin is sick or hurt, other dolphins work together to care for them.

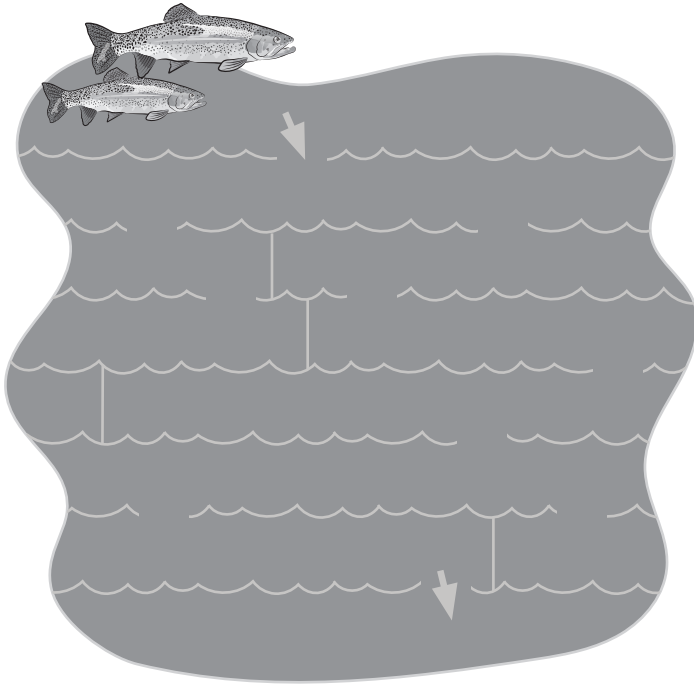
We can help dolphins, ducks, and other animals by keeping waterways clean and never littering.

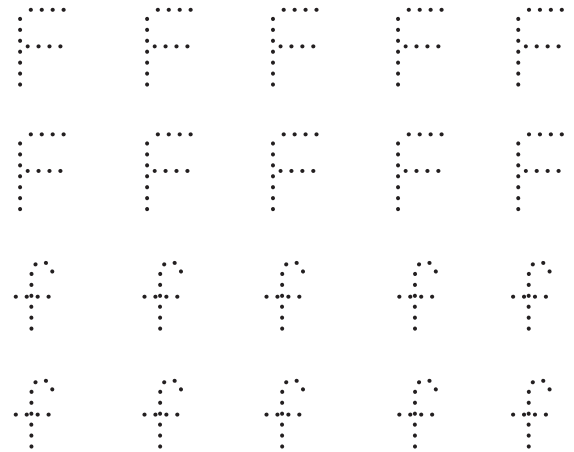
FROGS, FOXES, AND FISH

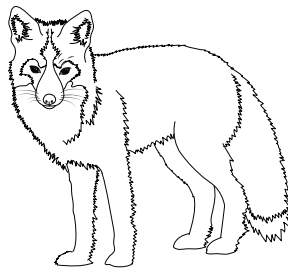

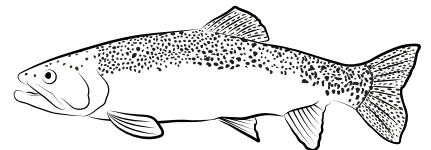
Did You Know?

Fish can learn, remember things, recognize themselves and one another, and form friendships—just like us!

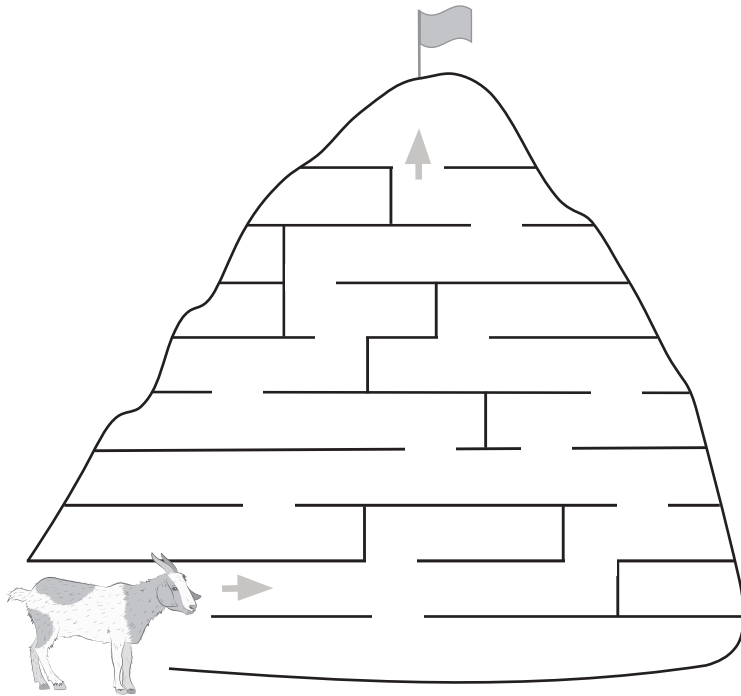
Humans can help other animals by keeping bodies of water, like ponds, rivers, streams, and seas, clean.

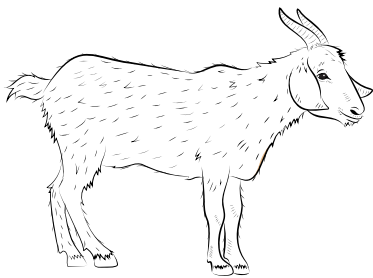
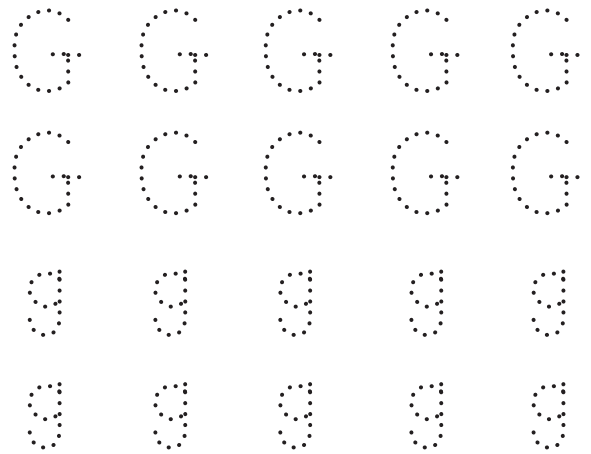
GOATS, GEESE, AND GORILLAS



Trace the path that leads the goat to the top of the hill.

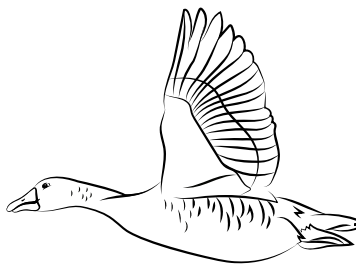

Gorillas comfort their friends and family members with gentle touches, cuddles, and hugs. How do you like to comfort your friends?

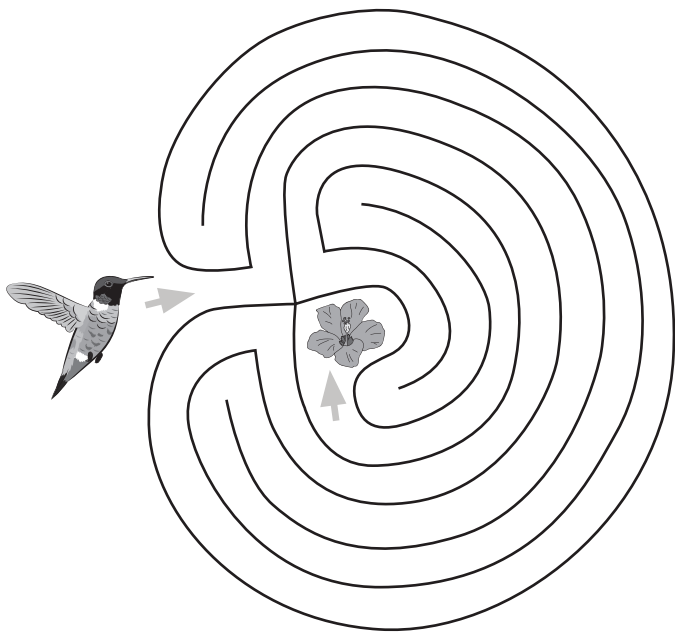

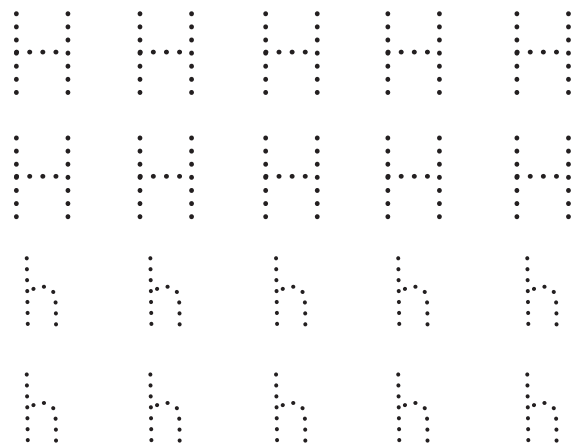
HENS, HORSES, AND HUMMINGBIRDS



Help the hummingbird fly to their favorite flower in the garden.

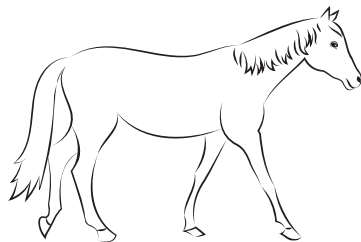

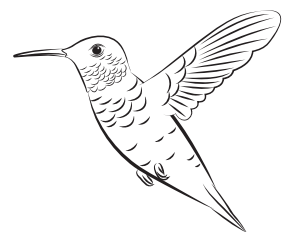
Did You Know?

Did You Know?

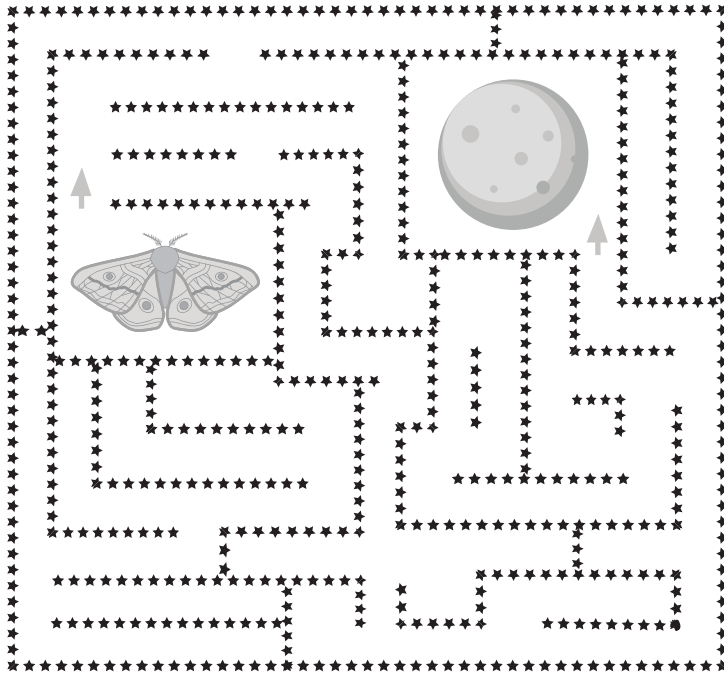
Hummingbirds remember where their favorite flowers grow and return to visit them again and again—kind of like humans visiting their favorite restaurants.

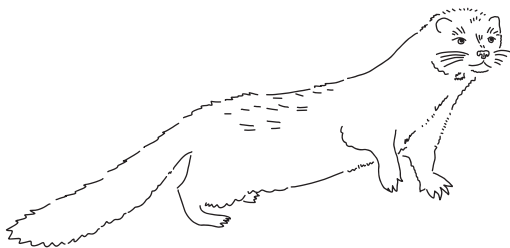
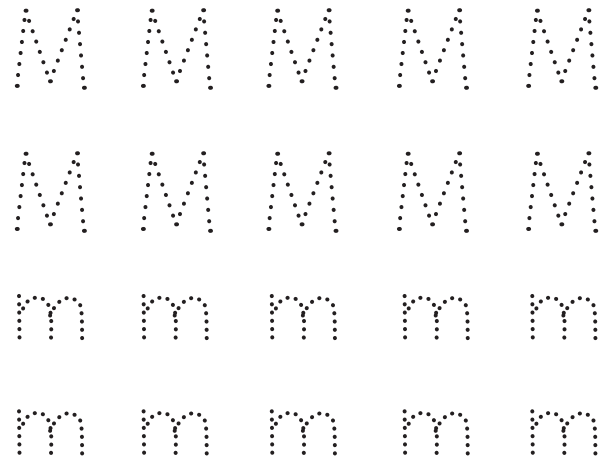
MINKS, MACAQUES, AND MOTHS

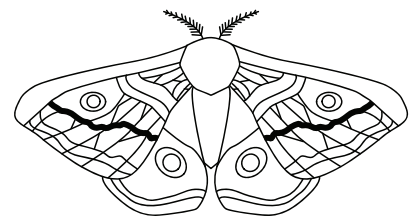
Did You Know?

Did You Know?

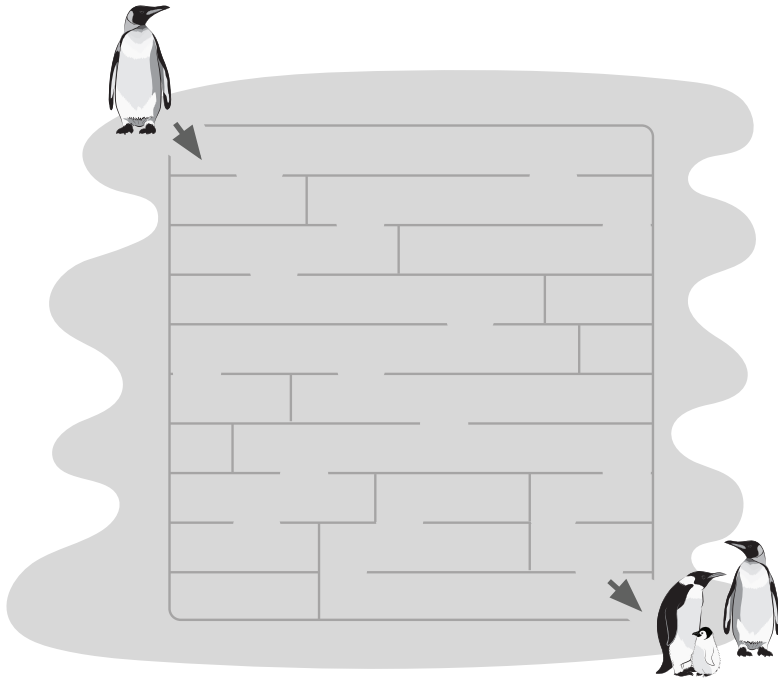

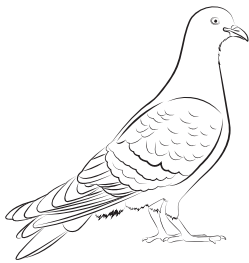
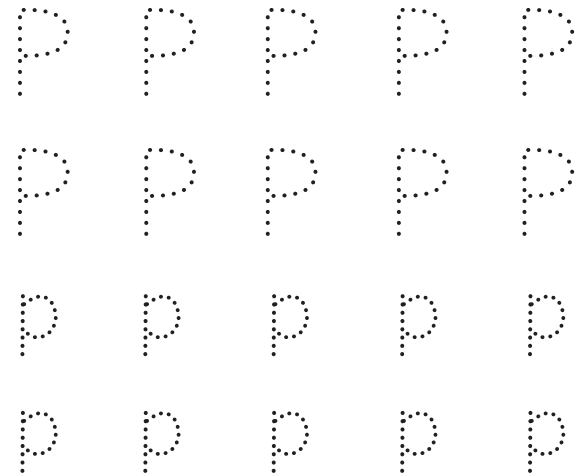
PIGEONS, PIGS, AND PENGUINS

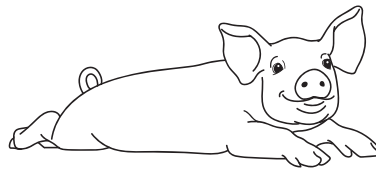

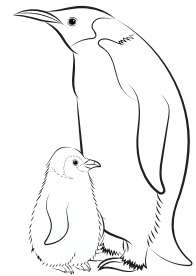
Did You Know?

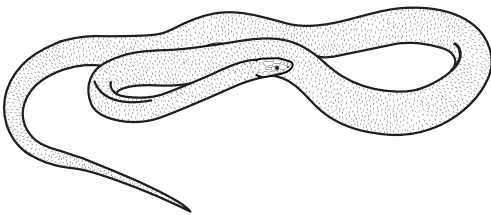
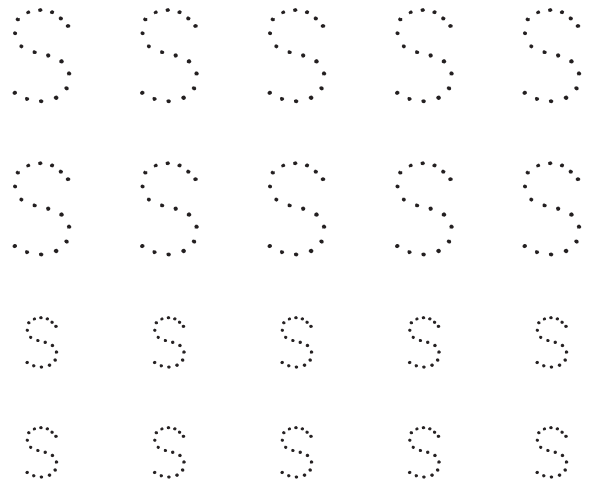
SNAKES, SILKWORMS, AND SPIDERS

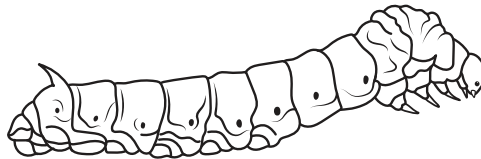

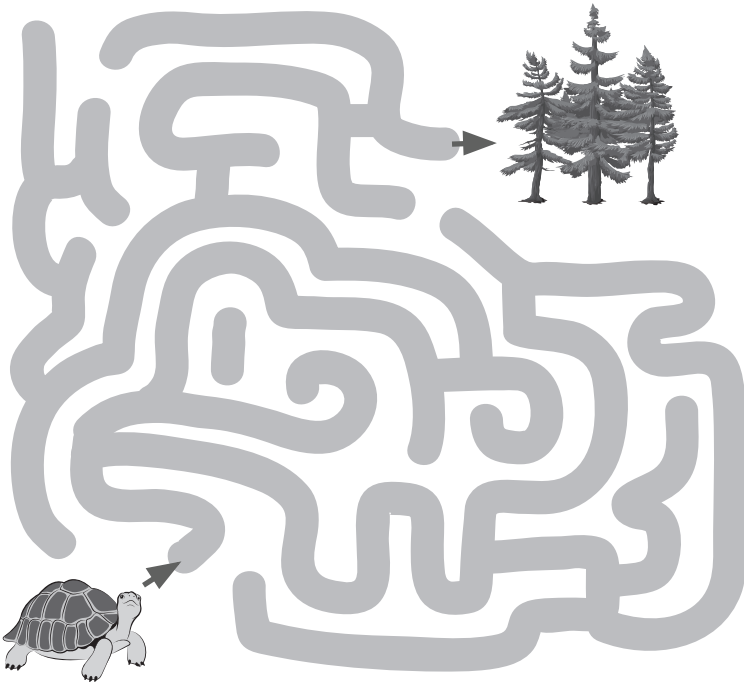
Mother whip spiders snuggle with their babies. Isn't that sweet?

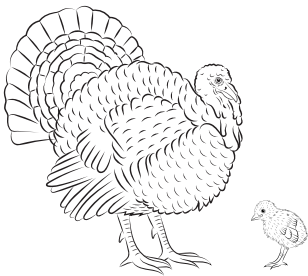
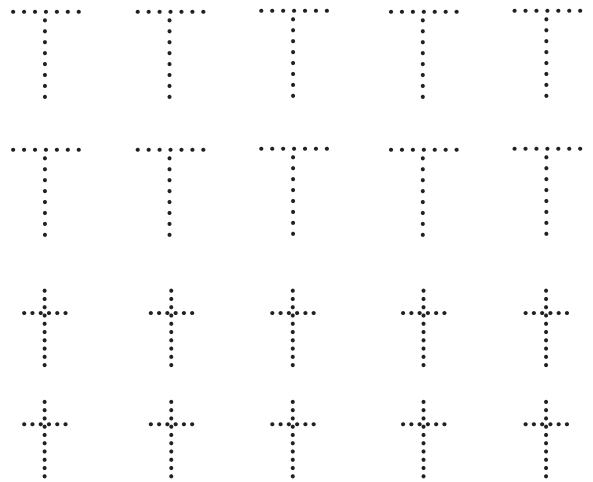
TURKEYS, TURTLES, AND TIGERS



Follow the winding path to help the turtle reach a safe and quiet forest.

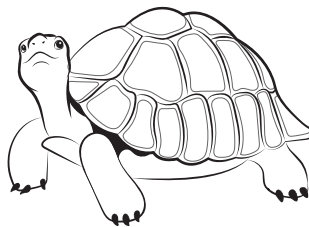

Did You Know?

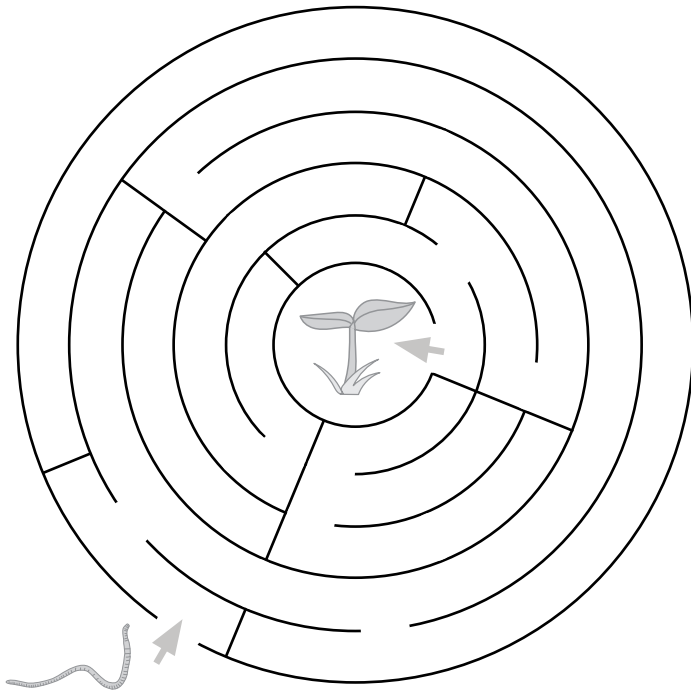
Tiger moms teach their cubs important life skills, and every tiger has a unique stripe pattern. Their stripes aren't only on their fur; they're part of their skin, too!

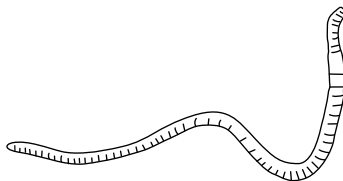

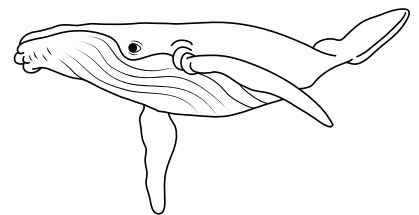
Did You Know?

Walruses love spending time with their friends and often snuggle close together on ice or beaches. Mother walruses are extremely caring, often cuddling their baby (called a calf) and picking them up with their flippers.



Did You Know?

Worms help plants grow by wiggling through the soil and loosening it as they move. Worms don't have lungs, and they need to breathe oxygen directly through their moist skin, which is why they come above ground when it rains.



Did You Know?

Whales talk to one another with special sounds that can travel for many miles through the ocean. Whales love to leap high out of the water and splash back down. Scientists think they do this to communicate, clean their skin, and just have fun!
